Babysitter, Three Girls Die in Pennsylvania Fire

CHESTER, Pa. (AP)—Three girls and a babysitter perished today in a fire that wrecked a home in nearby Wallingford, fashionable Philadelphia suburb. Police identified the girls as Stephanie, 8; Selby, 6; and Hilary, 3, only children of Mr. and Mrs. C. Robert Spencer. The woman caring for them was identified by firemen as Mrs. M.A. Wingate, of nearby Media. Spencer, 34-year-old Chester businessman, was vacationing with his 30-year-old wife Patricia in Atlantic City, N.J. They had left the

children in care of Mrs. W. The parents were notified of tragedy shortly after firemen reached the house and removed bodies. All were dead when firemen reached them, apparently of smoke inhalation. A neighbor saw the flames called firemen. Each of the girls was found huddled on the floor near her own bed. Mrs. Wingate found huddled on the floor master bedroom. Cause of the blaze could not be determined immediately.
